MINUTES SUMNER COUNTY BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS NOVEMBER 14, 2022

The Board of County Commissioners of Sumner County, Tennessee met in regular session on Monday, November 14, 2022, in the Commission Chambers of the Sumner County Administration Building in Gallatin, Tennessee at 7:00 p.m. Present and presiding was the Chairman Merrol N. Having a duly constituted quorum, the meeting was opened in due process by Chairman Merrol N. Hyde. Chairman Merrol Hyde noted that with twenty-four members seated, a simple majority would be by thirteen votes; and that matters requiring a two-thirds vote would be by sixteen votes during this session. Commissioners Harris, Lamberth and Wright were not present.

Commissioner Mansfield introduced the following resolution and moved for approval; seconded by Commissioner Miller.

2211-05 A RESOLUTION RESCINDING ACTIONS AND APPROVING AND ADOPTING AN UPDATED ETHICS & CONDUCT POLICY OF SUMNER COUNTY

BE IT RESOLVED by the Sumner County Board of County Commissioners meeting in regular session on this the 14th day of November 2022, that this body does hereby rescind all previous actions and resolutions related to the Code of Ethics Policy of Sumner County and hereby approves and adopts the updated Code of Ethics & Conduct Policy as set forth below:

CODE OF ETHICS & CONDUCT SUMNER COUNTY, TENNESSEE

Section 1. Definitions.

- (1) "County" means County, which includes all boards, committees, commissions, authorities, corporations, or other instrumentalities appointed or created by the county or an official of the county, and specifically including the county election commission and the county health department.
- (2) "Officials and employees" means and includes any official, whether elected or appointed, officer, employee or servant, or any member of any board, agency, commission, authority or corporation (whether compensated or not), or any officer, employee or servant thereof, of the county.
- (3) "Personal interest" means, for the purpose of disclosure of personal interests in accordance with this Code of Ethics & Conduct, a financial interest of the official or employee, or a financial interest of the official's or employee's spouse or child living in the same household, in the matter to be voted upon, regulated, supervised, or otherwise acted upon in an official capacity.

Section 2. Disclosure of personal interest in voting matters.

An official or employee with the responsibility to vote on a measure shall disclose during the meeting at which the vote takes place, before the vote and to be included in the minutes, any personal interest that affects or that would lead a reasonable person to infer that it affects the official's vote on the measure. In

addition, the official or employee may, to the extent allowed by law, recuse himself or herself from voting on the measure.

Section 3. Disclosure of personal interest in non-voting matters.

An official or employee who must exercise discretion relative to any matter other than casting a vote and who has a personal interest in the matter that affects or that would lead a reasonable person to infer that it affects the exercise of the discretion shall disclose, before the exercise of the discretion, when possible, the interest on the attached disclosure form and file the disclosure form with the county clerk. In addition, the official or employee may, to the extent allowed by law, recuse himself or herself from the exercise of discretion in the matter.

Section 4. Acceptance of gifts and other things of value.

An official or employee, or an official's or employee's spouse or child living in the same household, may not accept, directly or indirectly, any gift, money, gratuity, or other consideration or favor of any kind from anyone other than the county:

- (1) For the performance of an act, or refraining from performance of an act, that he would be expected to perform, or refrain from performing, in the regular course of his duties; or
- (2) That a reasonable person would understand was intended to influence the vote, official action, or judgment of the official or employee in executing county business.

An official or employee who accepts any gift, money, gratuity or other consideration or favor of any kind from anyone other than the county shall disclose such acceptance on the attached disclosure form and file the disclosure form with the county clerk.

It shall not be considered a violation of this policy for an official or employee to receive entertainment, food, refreshments, meals, health screenings, amenities, foodstuffs, or beverages that are provided in connection with a conference sponsored by an established or recognized statewide association of county government officials or by an umbrella or affiliate organization of such statewide association of county government officials.

Section 5. Ethics & Conduct Complaints.

To hold itself to the highest standard of personal conduct, the Sumner County Commission now establishes an Ethics & Conduct Committee. A County Ethics & Conduct Committee (the "Ethics & Conduct Committee") with membership consisting of five (5) Commissioners or citizens shall be appointed to one-year terms by the Committee on Committees with confirmation by the county legislative body, to be appointed each year at the same time as internal committees of the county legislative body. The Ethics & Conduct Committee shall convene as soon as practicable after their appointment and elect a chair and a secretary. The records of the Ethics & Conduct Committee shall be maintained

by the secretary and filed in the county clerk's office, where they shall be open to public inspection.

It shall be the duty of this Committee to hear complaints by citizens or other officials against any official acting in any capacity on behalf of Sumner County government in the performance of their responsibilities, including members of the County Legislative Body in regular sessions and committees. For members of the County Legislative Body, hearings of complaints will extend to all other public forums where the person has been identified officially as a County Commissioner.

Questions and complaints regarding violations of this Code of Ethics & Conduct or any breach of state law governing ethical conduct should be directed to the chair of the Ethics & Conduct Committee, County Law Director, or Staff Attorney(s). Complaints shall be in writing and signed by the person making the complaint and shall outline in reasonable detail the facts upon which the complaint is based.

The County Ethics & Conduct Committee shall investigate any credible complaint or misconduct against an official or employee charging any violation of this Code of Ethics & Conduct or may undertake an investigation on its own initiative when it acquires information indicating a possible violation and make recommendations for action to end or seek retribution for any activity that, in the Committee's judgment, constitutes a violation of this Code of Ethics & Conduct. If a member of the Committee is the subject of a complaint, such member shall recuse himself or herself from all proceedings involving such complaint.

Violations of the Code of Ethics & Conduct including, but not limited to, the following while performing official duties or being identified in an official position:

- (1) Unauthorized commitments or promises of any kind purporting to bind the County Commission to future obligations;
- (2) Using public office for personal gain;
- (3) Campaigning with principals or school staff in their official capacity as an employee of the school system in any manner, either on or off school property. Political activity by state employees, including principals and teachers, is regulated by the following three (3) statutes: The Little Hatch Act (Tennessee Code Annotated 2-19-201 through 208); Tennessee Code Annotated 8-30-306; and Title 5 United States Code Annotated 1501-1508. No part of the school system, or school property, including the facilities, the name, the staff, the students, or vehicles shall be used for political activities including but not limited to campaigning, political signs, political forum, or promoting political candidates;
- (4) Any actions subversive of good order, overt acts against peace, or which materially and substantially disrupts the order of business during meetings of the County Legislative Body;
- (5) Profanity, obscene gestures, or any sexual harassment during Commission Meetings or which reflects negatively on the character of the Commission, or its members, during meetings of the County Legislative Body;

For accusations of Ethics & Conduct violations, the Accused may:

- (1) Have a representative of choice present during public hearings of inquiry. All expenses related to representation by outside council will be borne by the accused, and shall not be the County Law Director or Staff Attorney(s).
- (2) Have adequate time given to present his/her defense. Adequate time will be designated at the beginning of the hearing by the Ethics & Conduct Committee.

For violations of the Code of Ethics & Conduct, the Committee may:

- (1) Refer the matter to the Office of the Law Director for a legal opinion and/or recommendations for action;
- (2) In the case of an official:
- (1) Refer the matter to the county legislative body for reprimand or public censure if the county legislative body finds such action warranted;
- (2) Counseling with the County Commission Chairman;
- (3) Removal of Board or Committee assignments until such member is restored to good standing or permanently replaced;
- (4) Removal from their assigned seat in the Commission Chambers to an alternate location safely away from others;
- (5) If a County Commissioner, officially request that the member resign his/her position as a County Commissioner;
- (6) If an appointed member of any County Boards or Committees, officially request that the member resign his/her position;
- (3) In the case of an employee, refer the matter to the official responsible for supervision of the employee for possible disciplinary action if the official finds discipline warranted;
- (4) In a case involving possible violation of state statutes, refer the matter to the district attorney for possible ouster or criminal prosecution;

The interpretation that a reasonable person in the circumstances would apply shall be used in interpreting and enforcing this Code of Ethics & Conduct. When a violation of this Code of Ethics & Conduct also constitutes a violation of a personnel policy or a civil service policy, the violation shall be dealt with as a violation of the personnel or civil service provisions rather than as a violation of this Code of Ethics & Conduct.

Section 6. Applicable State Laws.

In addition to the ethical principles set out in this Code of Ethics & Conduct, state laws also provide a framework for the ethical behavior of county officials and employees in the performance of their duties. Officials and employees should familiarize themselves with the state laws applicable to their office or position and the performance of their duties. To the extent that an issue is addressed by state law (law of general application, public law of local application, local option law, or private act), the provisions of that state law, to the extent they are more restrictive, shall control.

Following is a brief summary of selected state laws concerning ethics in county government. For the full text of these statutes, see the Tennessee Code Annotated (T.C.A.) sections indicated.

Campaign finance – T.C.A. Title 2, Chapter 10. Part One (campaign financial disclosure) requires candidates for public office to disclose contributions and contributors to their campaigns. Part Three (campaign contribution limits) limits the total amount of campaign contributions a candidate may receive from an individual and sets limits on the amount a candidate may receive in cash.

Conflict of interest – T.C.A. § 12-4-101 is the general conflict of interest statute that applies in all counties. It prohibits anyone who votes for, lets out, or in any manner supervises any work or contract from having a direct financial interest in that contract, purchase or work, and it requires disclosure of indirect financial interests by public acknowledgment.

Conflict of interest – T.C.A. § 49-6-2003 applies to the department of education in all counties and prohibits direct and indirect conflicts of interest in the sale of supplies for use in public schools.

Conflict of interest – T.C.A. § 5-1-125 applies in all counties and prohibits county officials and employees from purchasing surplus county property except where it is sold by public bid.

Conflict of interest – T.C.A. § 54-7-203 applies in all counties that are governed by the County Uniform Highway Law. It prohibits officials and employees in the highway department and members of the county legislative body from having any personal interest in purchases of supplies, materials, machinery, and equipment for the highway department.

Conflict of interest – T.C.A. § 5-14-114 applies in counties that have adopted the County Purchasing Law of 1957. It prohibits the purchasing agent, members of the county purchasing commission, members of the county legislative body, and other officials of the county from having a direct interest in a contract or purchase order for supplies, materials, equipment, or contractual services used by or furnished to a department or agency of the county government.

Conflict of interest – T.C.A. § 5-21-121 applies in counties that have adopted the County Financial Management System of 1981. It prohibits the director, purchasing agent, members of the committee, members of the county legislative body, other officials of the county, members of the board of education, members of the highway commission, and employees of the finance department and purchasing department from having a direct interest in the purchase of supplies, materials, equipment, or contractual services for the county. In addition, it requires the disclosure of indirect financial interests by public acknowledgment. Conflict of interest – T.C.A. § 5-5-112 governs conflict of interests of members of the county legislative body who are also employees of the county or whose spouse is an employee of the county.

Conflict of interest disclosure statements – T.C.A. § 8-50-501 and the following sections require candidates and appointees to local public offices to file a disclosure statement with the state ethics commission listing major sources of income, investments, lobbying activities, professional services provided, bankruptcies, certain loans, and other information, and to keep these statements up to date.

Gifts – T.C.A. § 5-14-114 applies in counties that have adopted the County Purchasing Law of 1957. It prohibits the purchasing agent, members of the county purchasing commission, members of the county legislative body, and other officials of the county from accepting or receiving, directly or indirectly, from a person, firm, or corporation to which a contract or purchase order may be awarded, by rebate, gift, or otherwise, money or anything of value whatsoever, or a promise, obligation, or contract for future reward or compensation.

Gifts – T.C.A. § 5-21-121 applies in counties that have adopted the County Financial Management System of 1981. It prohibits the finance director, purchasing agent, and employees in those departments from accepting anything of value, directly or indirectly, from anyone who furnishes supplies, materials or equipment to the county.

Honoraria – T.C.A. § 2-10-116 prohibits elected officials from accepting an honorarium (including money or anything of value, but not including reimbursement for actual expenses) for an appearance, speech, or article in their official capacity.

Private use of public property – T.C.A. § 54-7-202 applies in counties that are governed by the County Uniform Highway Law. It prohibits the private use of equipment, rock, and other highway materials.

Court sales – T.C.A. § 39-16-405 prohibits judges, clerks of court, court officers, and employees of court, from bidding on or purchasing any property sold through the court for which such person discharges official duties.

Sheriff sales - T.C.A. § 8-8-206 prohibits sheriffs and deputy sheriffs from purchasing, either directly or indirectly, any property sold through their own judicial sale no matter which court is involved.

Rules of the Supreme Court – Rule 10, Cannon 5 (Code of Judicial Conduct) establishes ethical rules for judges and other court personnel when exercising judicial functions.

Fee statutes – T.C.A. §§ 8-21-101, 8-21-102, and 8-21-103 set out circumstances where fees are authorized, prohibit officials from requiring payment of fees in advance of performance of services except where specifically authorized, and set penalties for charging excessive or unauthorized fees.

Consulting fee prohibition for elected county officials – T.C.A. §§ 2-10-122 and 2-10-124 prohibit officials from receiving compensation for advising or assisting a person or entity in influencing county legislative or administrative action.

Crimes involving public officials— T.C.A. § 39-16-101 and the following sections prohibit bribery, soliciting unlawful compensation, and buying and selling in regard to offices.

Official misconduct – T.C.A. § 39-16-402 applies to public servants and candidates for office and prohibits unauthorized exercise of official power, acting in an official capacity exceeding the servant's power, refusal to perform a duty imposed by law, violating a law relating to the servant's office or employment, and receiving a benefit not provided by law.

Official oppression – T.C.A. § 39-16-403 prohibits abuse of power by a public servant

Bribery for votes – T.C.A. §§ 2-19-121, 2-19-126, and 2-19-127 prohibit bribery of voters in elections.

Misuse of official information – T.C.A. § 39-16-404 prohibits a public servant from attaining a benefit or aiding another person in attaining a benefit from information which was obtained in an official capacity and is not available to the public.

Ouster law – T.C.A. § 8-47-101 sets out conduct which is punishable by ouster from office, including misconduct in office and neglect of duty.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a summary of the Ethics & Conduct Policy is attached as Exhibit A; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the form attached as Exhibit B shall be used by all County Officials and employees to disclose potential issues with personal interests; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the form attached as Exhibit C shall be used by all County Officials and employees to disclose the acceptance of gifts; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that any complaint, allegations of misconduct, or question about this policy shall be presented to the Clerk on the appropriate form (attached here as Exhibit D); and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a copy of the Ethics & Conduct Policy as well as Exhibit A, B, C, and D shall be furnished to the Office of the County Clerk for review by interested parties.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED this Resolution replaces Resolution 0705-05 from May 21, 2007; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that any previous resolutions of this body in conflict with this resolution are hereby repealed; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the provisions of this resolution are hereby declared to be severable, and if any provision of this resolution or the application of such provision to any person or circumstance is declared in conflict with state

law, such declaration shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this resolution.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this resolution shall become effective upon passage, the public welfare requiring it.

2211-06 A RESOLUTION RESCINDING ACTIONS AND ESTABLISHING NEW PROCEDURES REGARDING THE APPOINTMENT OF MEMBERS OF THE SUMNER COUNTY REGIONAL PLANNING COMMISSION AND ADOPTING NEW PROCEDURES

WHEREAS, the Sumner County Regional Planning Commission ("the Planning Commission") was created to address the vast areas of our county that had no ties to the numerous cities and to provide adequate representation to the countless unincorporated citizens that did not have a voice in municipal planning and zoning issues and various matters that effected their property values and uses; and

WHEREAS, even though previous resolutions by this body called the organization by the name "regional planning commission," it never operated as

an organization that set or oversaw planning issues within city limits, and the various and diverse cities of our county created separate and distinct municipal planning commissions to address the land use concerns of the cities and their citizens; and

WHEREAS, this body desires to rescind the old resolutions addressing membership in the old body and establish a new Sumner County Regional

Planning Commission to serve better the need for responsible growth for all Sumner County and its citizens, and shall especially be reflective of the unincorporated areas of Sumner County.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Sumner County Board of County Commissioners meeting in regular session on this the 14th day of November 2022, that this body does hereby rescind any and all of its previous actions prior to this meeting concerning the appointment of members and establishment of the number of members as well as the terms of office of the Sumner County Regional Planning Commission; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that pursuant to the terms and conditions of this resolution, The Sumner County Regional Planning Commission wishes to better address the needs of the unincorporated portions of the county and its citizens through the re-creation of the Sumner County Regional Planning Commission, which shall be organized as a seven (7) member body whose membership shall be constituted as provided herein:

1. Organization:

The Planning Commission shall be organized as a seven (7) member Body ("New Formula"), and this resolution shall reconfigure the make up of the Regional Planning Commission and rescind any previous conflicting resolutions passed by the body.

WHEREAS T.C.A. § 39-17-911 states, "It is unlawful for any person to knowingly sell or loan for monetary consideration or otherwise exhibit or make available to a minor . . .(a)(1)Any picture, photograph, drawing, sculpture, motion picture film, video game, computer software game, or similar visual representation or image of a person or portion of the human body, that depicts nudity, sexual conduct, excess violence, or sado-masochistic abuse, and that is harmful to minors; or, (a)(2) Any book, pamphlet, magazine, printed matter, however reproduced, or sound recording, which contains any matter enumerated in subdivision (a)(1), or that contains explicit and detailed verbal descriptions or narrative accounts of sexual excitement, sexual conduct, excess violence, or sado-masochistic abuse, and that is harmful to minors"; and

WHEREAS a violation of T.C.A. § 39-17-911 was found in the book *Lawn Boy*, by Jonathan Evison which was purchased and distributed in Sumner County schools, and text found in the book has a grown man thinking about graphically narrated sex between two small boys; and

WHEREAS a sampling of such unlawful passages as displayed on page 174 of the book *Lawn Boy* reads as follows: "He talked about all the times at the church but never mentioned our penises, or the fact that he never said ten words to me after our little foray in the bushes. Not a single reference to holding or tugging or sucking d**ks. All I could think about while he was chatting me up over the rim of his cappuccino was his little salamander between my fourth-grade fingers, rapidly engorging with blood."; and

WHEREAS violation of the above statute is a Class A misdemeanor in the State of Tennessee; and

WHEREAS T.C.A. § 49-06-1019(a) establishes several concepts which shall not be included or promoted in curriculums and supplemental materials of primary and secondary schools within the State of Tennessee, such as:

- (1) One (1) race or sex is inherently superior to another race or sex;
- (2) An individual, by virtue of the individual's race or sex, is inherently privileged, racist, sexist, or oppressive, whether consciously or subconsciously;
- (3) An individual should be discriminated against or receive adverse treatment because of the individual's race or sex;
- **(4)** An individual's moral character is determined by the individual's race or sex:
- **(5)** An individual, by virtue of the individual's race or sex, bears responsibility for actions committed in the past by other members of the same race or sex:
- **(6)** An individual should feel discomfort, guilt, anguish, or another form of psychological distress solely because of the individual's race or sex;
- (7) A meritocracy is inherently racist or sexist, or designed by a particular race or sex to oppress members of another race or sex;

- (8) This state or the United States is fundamentally or irredeemably racist or sexist;
- **(9)** Promoting or advocating the violent overthrow of the United States government;
- (10) Promoting division between, or resentment of, a race, sex, religion, creed, nonviolent political affiliation, social class, or class of people;
- (11) Ascribing character traits, values, moral or ethical codes, privileges, or beliefs to a race or sex, or to an individual because of the individual's race or sex;
- (12) The rule of law does not exist, but instead is a series of power relationships and struggles among racial or other groups;
- (13) All Americans are not created equal and are not endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable rights, including, life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness; or
- (14) Governments should deny to any person within the government's jurisdiction the equal protection of the law,
- WHEREAS T.C.A. § 49-06-1019(b) does not prohibit an LEA or public charter school from including, as part of a course of instruction or in a curriculum or instructional program, or from allowing teachers or other employees of the LEA or public charter school to use supplemental instructional materials that include:
- (1) The history of an ethnic group, as described in textbooks and instructional materials adopted in accordance with part 22 of this chapter;
 - (2) The impartial discussion of controversial aspects of history;
- (3) The impartial instruction on the historical oppression of a particular group of people based on race, ethnicity, class, nationality, religion, or geographic region; or
- **(4)** Historical documents relevant to subdivisions (b)(1)-(3) that are permitted under § 49-6-1011.
- WHERAS T.C.A. § 49-06-1019(c) states specifically, "If the commissioner of education finds that an LEA or public charter school knowingly violated this section, then the commissioner shall withhold state funds, in an amount determined by the commissioner, from the LEA or public charter school until the LEA or public charter school provides evidence to the commissioner that the LEA or public charter school is no longer in violation of this section",
- **WHEREAS** violations of T.C.A. § 49-06-1019(a) were found in the books *A Place Inside of Me, by Zetta Elliott,* and *Dragonwings* by Laurence Yep, which were purchased and distributed in Sumner County schools, and text found in the books has examples of racism, foul language, underage drinking, violence, drugs, prostitution, alcohol, hatred of police, overthrow of the government, destruction of the nuclear family, and communism.
- **WHEREAS** the Sumner County Commission is committed to supporting the just laws of the State of Tennessee by ensuring against violation against our laws by a single individual's opinion, judgment, or ideology; and,
- **WHEREAS** the administration and Board of Education of Sumner County Schools have failed to comply with Tennessee law; and,
- **WHEREAS** statements by some individual staff and administrative personnel indeed appear to argue for direct defiance of Tennessee law; and,
- **BE IT RESOLVED** that the Sumner County Commission strongly encourages the formation of three material and curriculum review committees, one each for the elementary, middle, and high school levels, to review appropriate books for the school district. Further, it is resolved the Director of Schools and the Chief

Academic Officer, are hereby strongly encouraged to ensure that the Sumner County School environment is free from obscene and provocative material, in accordance with Tennessee Code.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this body directs the Office of the Law Director to send copies of this resolution to all members of the Sumner County School Board.
