- I. CALL TO ORDER by Chairman Shoaf at 7:00pm in Room 112 of the Sumner County Administration Building in Gallatin, TN.
 - A. Invocation- Led by Commissioner Brown.
 - B. Approval of Agenda- Chairman Shoaf stated, without objection, he would like to remove item V.A.1 from the agenda. Motion to approve amended agenda by Commissioner Mansfield, second by Commissioner Schmit, unanimous approval.

Please be advised that we have experienced water issues in several county buildings. In order to deal with the emergency, I have requested P.O.'s to start the mitigation and restoration process.

County Administration Building- On 12/24, a sprinkler pipe froze and burst causing significant water issues on all four floors. The affected offices are Finance, Voter Registration Storage, Register of Deeds, and County Clerk. The fire department was quick to respond and maintenance team along with myself worked through day and evening moving equipment and working with ServPro to clean the affected areas. ServPro's equipment is on site and we will start the demo and restoration of the offices. The current estimated costs are \$50,000. This does not include business equipment, office supplies, etc. The officers are working on these numbers.

Juvenile Court- On 12/24, a sprinkler head burst. The fire department and Judge Howard along with the maintenance team worked into the evening to contain the water with no damage. This property is leased and the owner will bear the costs associated with repairing the sprinkler.

Millersville Library- On 12/25, a pipe froze and burst over the ladies restroom causing significant flooding throughout the premises. The police and fire department was quick to respond and, with the library workers and maintenance team, worked through day and evening moving equipment and working with ServPro to clean the affected areas. ServPro's equipment is on site and we will start the demo and restoration of the offices. The current estimated costs are \$50,000. This does not include business equipment, office supplies, etc. The library manager is working on these numbers.

Gallatin Library- On 12/28, a sprinkler broke. The police and fire department was quick to respond and, with the library workers and maintenance team, worked quickly to contain the water with no damage.

The libraries will be closed until the restoration process is complete and codes/fire marshal approves occupancy.

Darrell,

Section 5-14-204, *Tennessee Code Annotated*, covers emergency purchases over \$10,000.

The County Finance Department will approve an emergency purchase order over \$10,000 that the office would otherwise bid if it meets the requirements below.

1. Complies with the definition of an emergency
 - a. "an unforeseen combination of circumstances or the resulting state that calls for immediate action"
 - b. "an urgent need for assistance or relief"
2. Because of the urgency, the time required to bid creates a significant risk of one or more of the following
 - a. Danger to employees or the public
 - b. Danger of unnecessary property damage
 - c. Danger of significant unnecessary disturbances of county services

The following applies if the purchase does not exceed the total available balance of appropriations in a major category (as determined by the State's Uniform Chart of Accounts).

"A report of any emergency purchase shall be made as soon as possible to the county governing body and the county mayor, and shall include all items of information as required in the record."

The report "shall specify the amount paid, the items purchased, from whom the purchase was made, and the nature of the emergency."

The report is on the Sumner County Budget Committee's agenda, as item III <https://sumnercountyttn.gov/wp-content/uploads/2022/12/January-9-2023-Budget-Committee-Agenda-1.pdf>.

Only purchase orders issued before the agenda went out are included. I plan to provide copies of all of these purchase orders Monday to committee members.

Even though some of these are below \$10,000, we provided copies to present a complete picture.

The Finance Office issued purchase orders for one or more of the following reasons: to remove water and moisture, winterize or re-winterize buildings, prevent further damage to recently installed flooring, prevent additional water or moisture damage, or avoid disturbances of services.

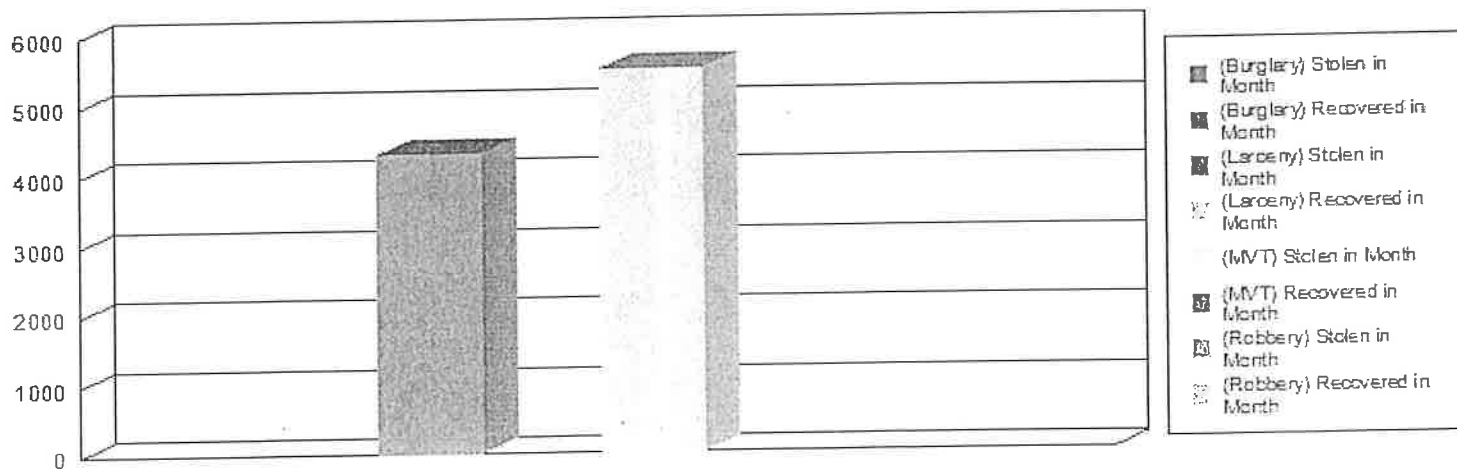

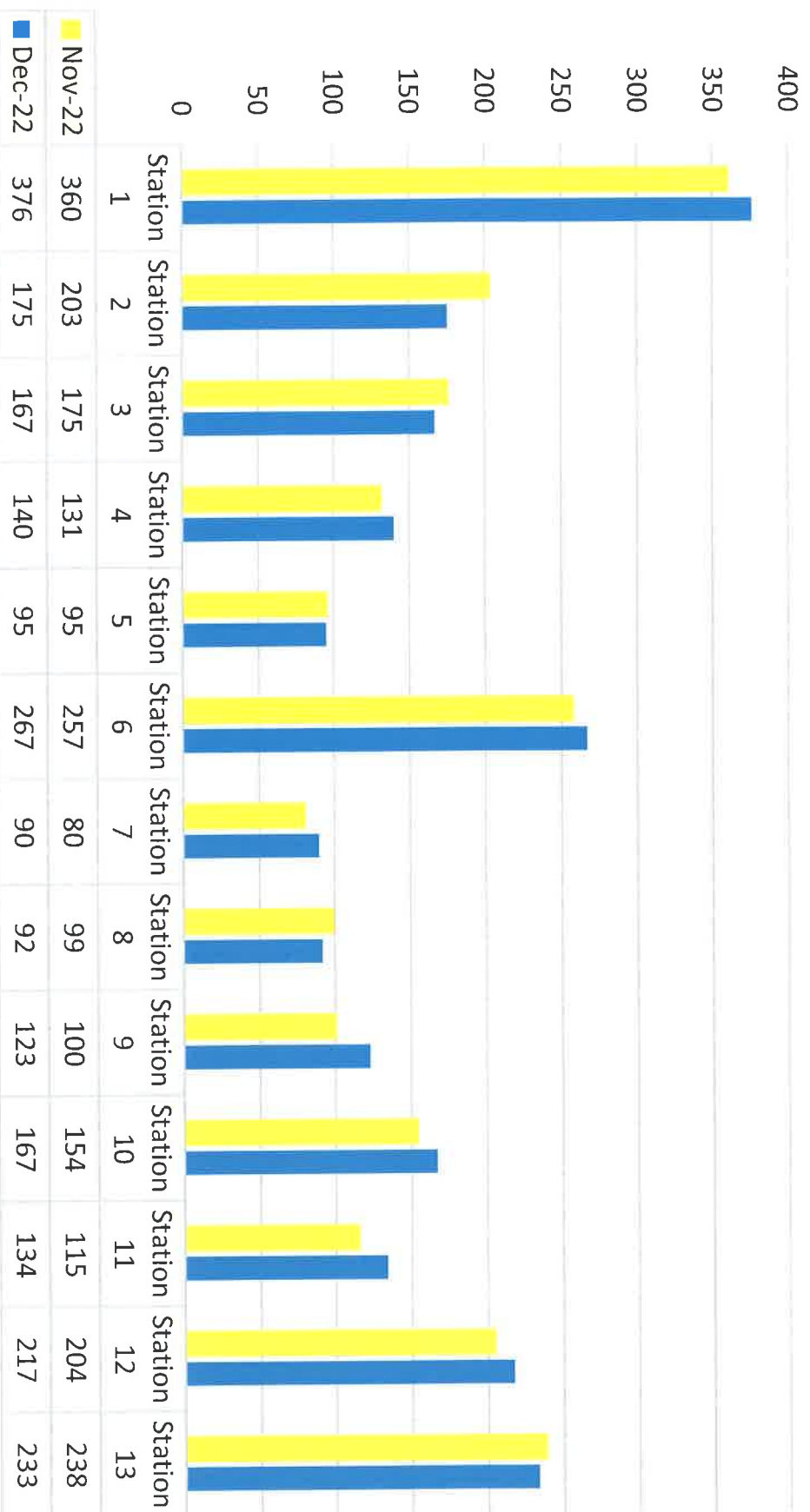

FY2022-23 EMS Revenue



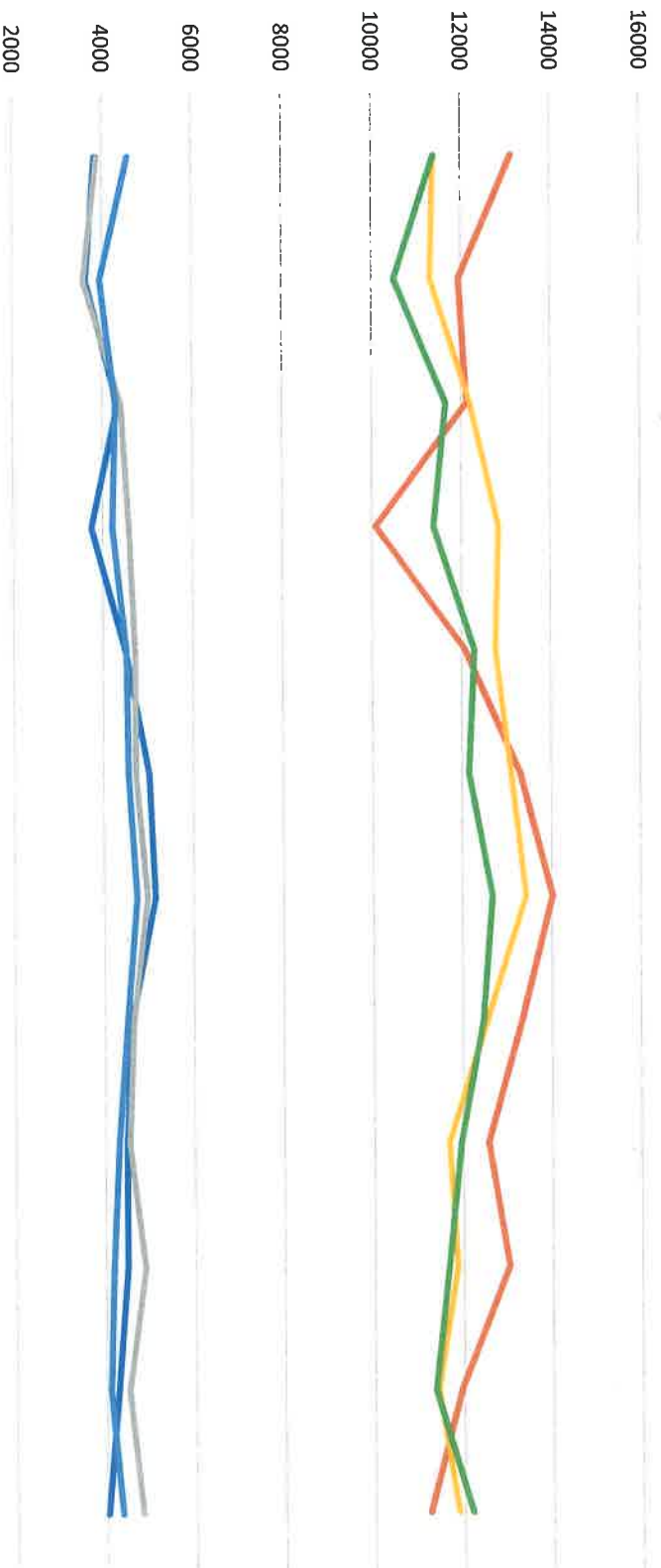

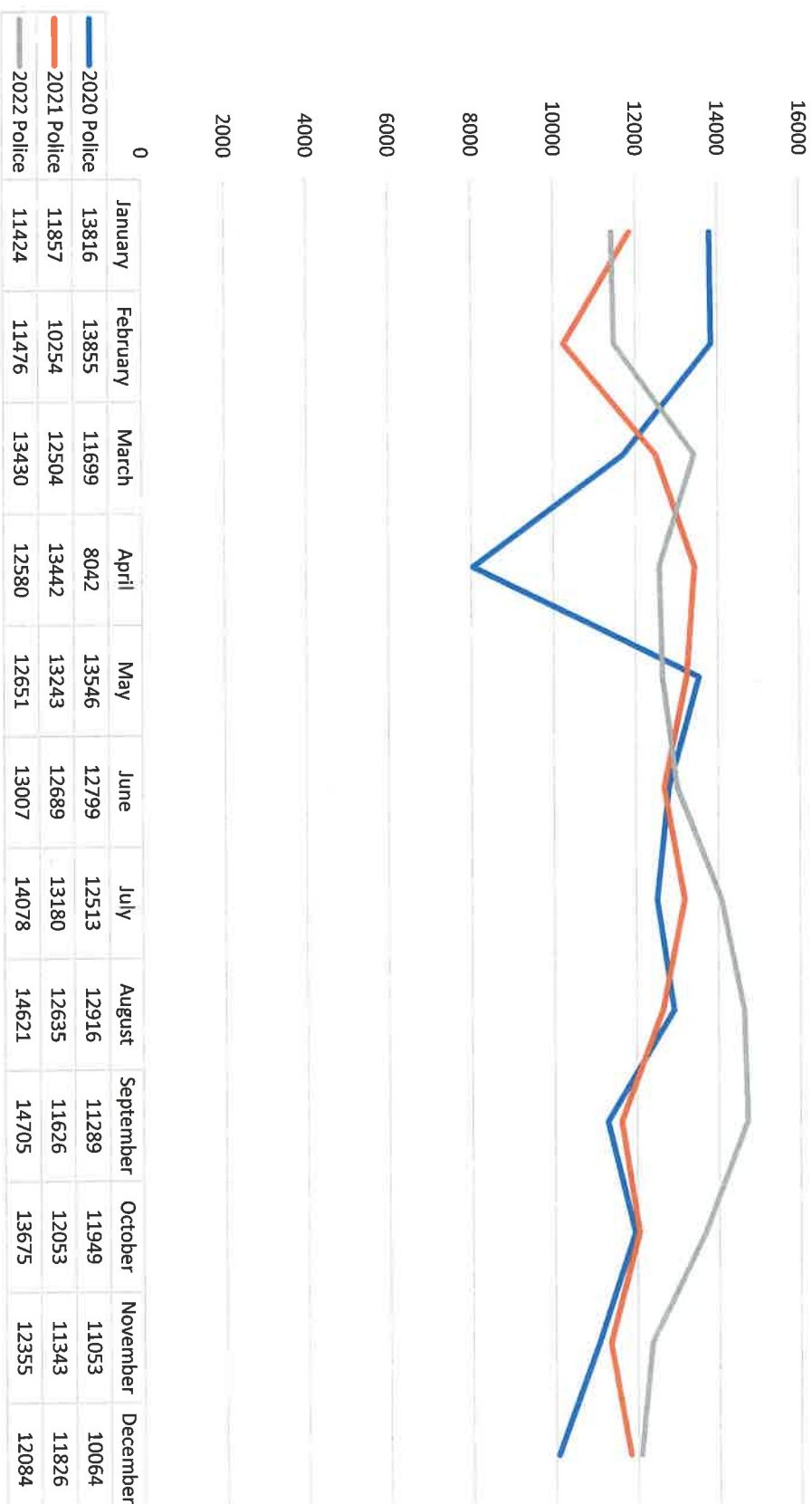

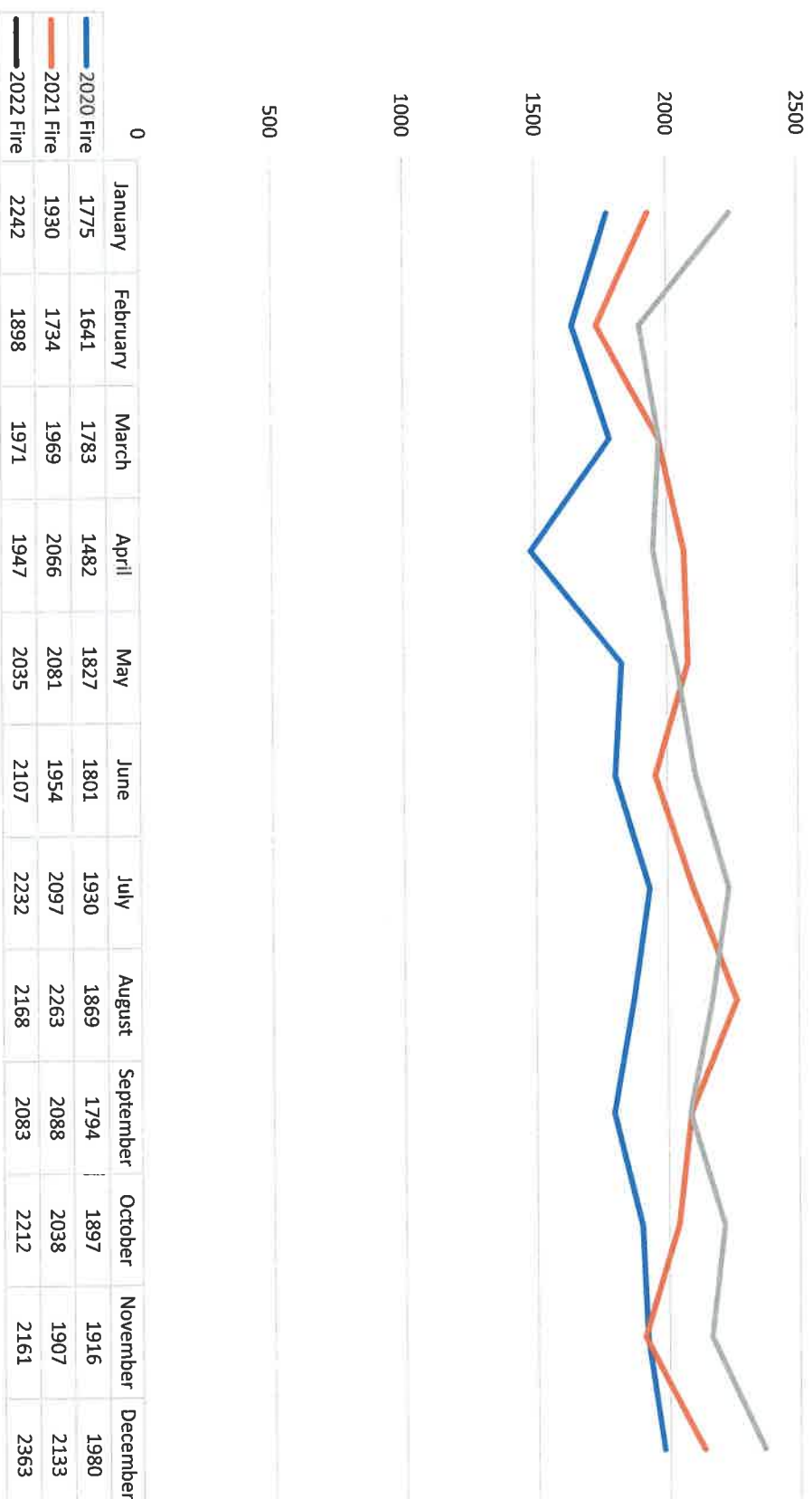
Police Total Number of Calls for Service

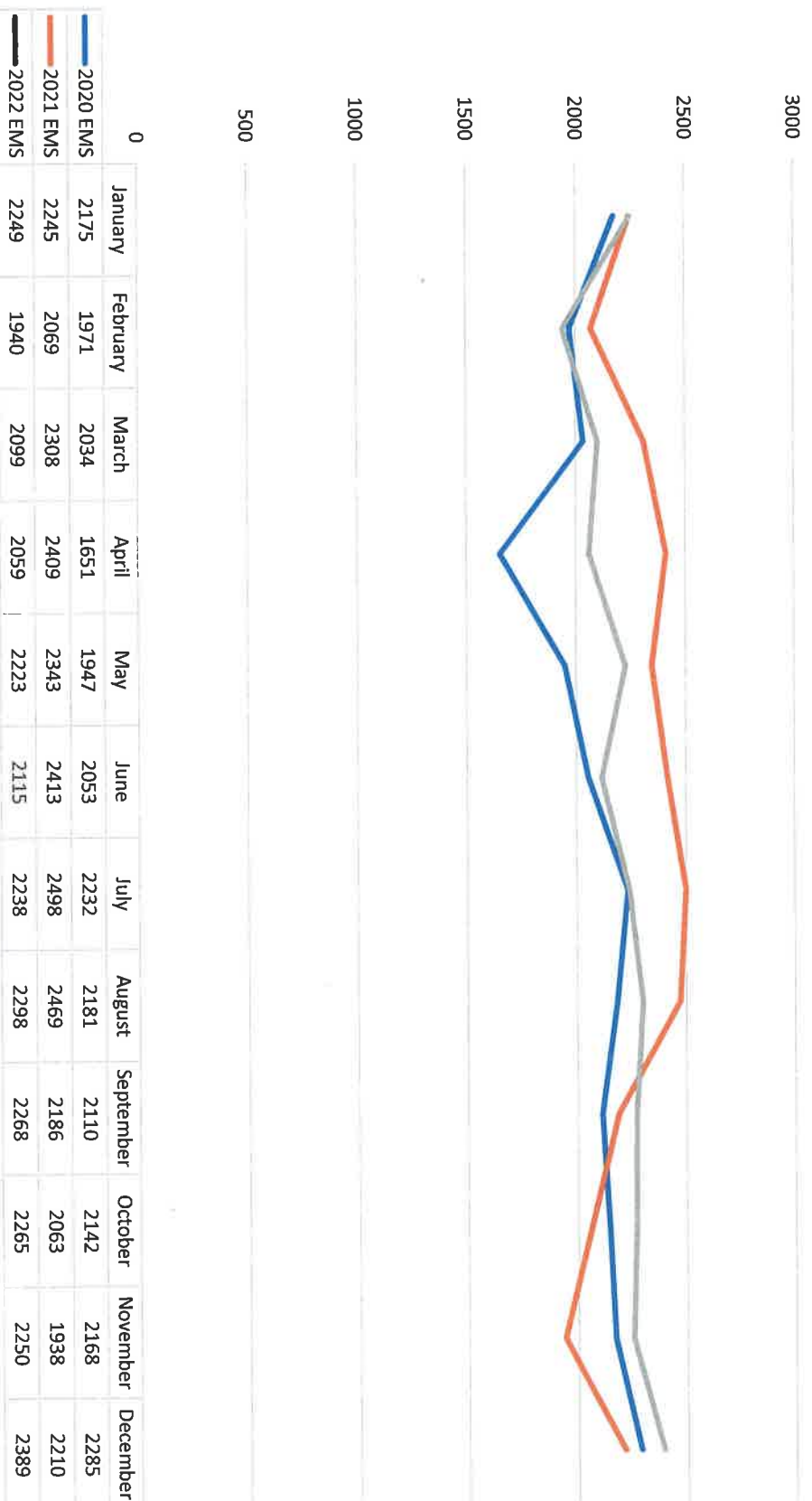

AND STATE ATTORNEY GENERAL TAKE APPROPRIATE ACTION
TO PROTECT THE MEDICAL FREEDOM OF THOSE SERVING IN
THE TENNESSEE ARMY AND AIR NATIONAL GUARD AND
TENNESSEE STATE GUARD**

RESOLUTION 2023-XX

WHEREAS, the Tennessee Army and Air National Guard provide a vital service to the citizens of Tennessee in times of emergency, and to the United States for national security; and

WHEREAS, the Biden Administration and the U.S. Secretary of Defense Llyod Austin issued an arbitrary order that Tennessee Army and Air National Guard service members be vaccinated against the Covid-19 virus as a condition of their service to the state and nation; and

WHEREAS, the above cited vaccination mandate has had extremely negative impacts on recruiting and retention efforts, compromising the readiness of the Tennessee Army and Air National Guard, and violate the medical freedom of our guardsmen; and

WHEREAS, the Biden Administration has, because of the successful petition of military and civilian leaders concerned with the readiness of our Nation's armed forces, relented on its ill-advised vaccine mandate programs.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Sumner County, Tennessee Board of Commissioners meeting this ____ Day of _____ 2023:

SECTION 1: That the Governor of Tennessee is hereby urged to take the following steps, consistent with his powers as the chief executive of the State of Tennessee, to restore readiness to Tennessee National Guard units and to mitigate against the negative impacts of such readiness as caused by the arbitrary and unjustified actions of the Biden administration which required COVID-19 vaccinations of Tennessee Guardsmen as a condition of service to our great state and our nation.

- a. Publicly condemn the firings and non-pay status of Tennessee Army and Air National Guard members because of service members refusal to take a hastily developed vaccine; and
- b. direct the Adjutant General, Tennessee National Guard, to immediately reinstate the Tennessee Army and Air National Guard members full benefits who have refused the COVID-19 vaccine; and
- c. issue a letter of apology to Tennessee Army and Air National Guard members who were separated from service due to the above-stated refusal; and
- d. request the Tennessee Adjutant General, Major General Jeffery Holmes, to halt any further firings of Tennessee Army and Air National Guard members who have refused the COVID-19 vaccine, including those with medical or religious exemptions; and
- e. file a Request for Information and/or subpoena the Tennessee Army and Air National Guard for any documentation related to vaccination results within the state regarding vaccine injuries, guard member retention, and readiness of the force over the past 6 years and make public any findings thereof; and
- f. terminate the COVID-19 vaccine mandate for the Tennessee State Guard, a volunteer state force that is not federally funded and cannot be federalized for any deployments; and
- g. request that the Tennessee General Assembly draft legislation, consistent with Title 32 United States Code, which forbids the President of the United States, via the United States Department of Defense, from requiring any medical treatment of any kind for Tennessee National Guard service members without the express consent of the Governor and General Assembly of the State of Tennessee.

SECTION 2: That a copy of this resolution be transmitted to each of the Representatives and State Senators that represent Sumner County, Tennessee with the recommendation that appropriate action be taken by the Tennessee General Assembly in regular or special called session to facilitate the recommendations made in Section 1 of this resolution.

SECTION 3: That a copy of this resolution be transmitted by the Sumner County Clerk to each of the other county clerks in the state of Tennessee through the Tennessee State Association of County Clerks with the recommendation that this resolution be considered for action by other county legislative bodies in the state of Tennessee to mitigate the harm caused by arbitrary and unjustified vaccine mandates made by the Biden Administration and the United States Secretary of Defense Llyod Austin on August 24th, 2021.
