5. Recognition of the Public.

Joanna Daniels of 152 N Shadowhaven Way, Hendersonville expressed her concerns about a budget amendment item for an early literacy school kit. She also spoke against school surveys for students.

Katie Brown, Assistant Director of Schools for Student Support explained the surveys are a long standing practice and stated they are anonymous with no identifiable information.

6. Report of the Chairman. Chairman Brown gave a brief overview of the Education Ad Hoc meeting and safety in schools.

Comm. Rogers moved, seconded by Comm. Miller, to approve the resolution and forward to full Commission, as amended. The motion carried unanimously.

a. Board of Education Amendments (Information only). No action needed

Comm. Boyt moved, seconded by Comm. Miller, to discuss. The motion carried unanimously.

Comm. Boyt asked the Law Director to explain what "for information only" means. Law Director Eric Sitler explained that it is to keep the Commission apprised on what they are going to do. Commission Chairman Hyde explained that it is allowed if it is within category.

Chairman Brown expressed concerns ESSER funds are being used for recurring expenses.

b. School Climate Surveys. No action taken

Comm. Rogers moved, seconded by Comm. Miller, to discuss. The motion carried unanimously.

Comm. Rogers asked to suspend the rules to allow Katie Brown to answer who wrote the surveys. Katie Brown stated the surveys are written and compiled by EMT – Evaluation Management Training.

Joanna Daniels spoke to new legislature that is in progress that would change so parents would have to opt in to the surveys instead of opting out.

Chief of EMS

SUMMARY: The Chief of EMS is responsible for administering, coordinating, supervising and managing all aspects of Sumner County EMS (dba Sumner EMS, Sumner County Ambulance Service). Management requirements include knowledge of operational, budgetary and protocol documents. The Chief is responsible for effective communications with the Sumner EMS Medical Director, municipal clients, Health and Emergency Services Committee, organizational leaders, partnering agencies and other industry representatives. The position of Chief of EMS reports directly to the Mayor of Sumner County.

Position requirements include defining, ordering, and management of all EMS related equipment and supplies. Job duties are focused on providing high-quality, cost-effective EMS service delivery by SCEMS personnel and overall program management.

ESSENTIAL DUTIES AND REPONSIBILITIES: The following list of duties and responsibilities are intended to illustrate the primary functions of the position and are not intended to be all-inclusive.

- Administers and supervises all aspects of the SCEMS services to include:
- Leading all Executive leadership and Command staff personnel
- Ensures there is adequate shift coverage and maintains SCEMS in a constant state of readiness.
- Formulates operational, budgetary, and protocol documents.
- Communicates with the Medical Director, organizational leaders, municipal clients, Committee members, partnering agencies and industry representatives.
- Evaluates, observes and oversees the Assistant Chief and assists with payroll, revenue recovery, State of Tennessee Office of EMS compliance.
- Evaluates, observes and oversees the Deputy Chief of Logistics and oversees the purchasing and distribution of all EMS related equipment and supplies.
- Evaluates, observes and oversees the Deputy Chief of Compliance and Safety to ensure compliance with all Local, State and Federal compliance and conforms to all HIPAA requirements.
- Evaluates, observes and assists Deputy Chief of Training with EMS education, training and related activities.
- Attends internal and external meetings as the formal EMS representative of SCEMS to provide insight, advice and direction on EMS related topics.
- Oversees auditing and quality assurance of medical reports completed by SCEMS personnel to ensure adherence to established protocols.
- Provides oversight and supervision of more than 130 staff members assigned to EMS operations.
- Responds to major incidents, severe weather events, mass casualty events and any mass casualty events and serves as an Incident Commander for EMS
- Provides a variety of reports as necessary to the County Mayor, the health and emergency services committee, SCEMS leadership team and SCEMS Medical Director.
- Conducts audits and case reviews of significant calls.
- Serves as a direct liaison with EMS coordinators of partnering agencies, EMS services and fire departments and law enforcement agencies.

- Serves as the representative to the Middle Tennessee EMS Director's Association.
- Assists with the development of the annual operating budget for SCEMS.
- Serves as, or supervises, the SCEMS Infection Control Officer.
- Participates in grant writing processes related to EMS.
- Attends monthly meetings with various groups, committees and associations and serves as primary contact for SCEMS.
- Attends Tennessee Ambulance Service Association Meetings.
- Performs other duties as needed.

QUALIFICATIONS: The requirements listed below are representative of the knowledge, skills, and abilities required to effectively perform the necessary job functions of this position. KNOWLWEDGE, SKILLS, AND ABILITIES

- Ability to communicate effectively both orally and in writing.
- Ability to understand and follow oral and written instructions.
- Ability to record important information accurately and in a timely fashion.
- Ability to establish and maintain effective working relationships with other employees' representatives of other agencies and the general public.
- Ability to work effectively with the public in situations involving severe physical and personal trauma.
- Ability to work independently or as part of a team.
- Ability to respond to emergency scenes as needed.
- Ability train personnel.
- Ability to provide strategic level program oversight and vision.
- Ability to lead and manage others.
- Knowledge and expertise in the principles and practice of emergency medicine as demonstrated by previous education, training, work experience and appropriate certifications.
- Knowledge of or ability to learn program budget responsibilities.
- Ability to create, utilize and read Word, graph, spreadsheet, and table documents or reports.
- Ability to safely operate SCEMS staff vehicles and to maintain a valid Tennessee Driver's License.
- Knowledge and ability to appropriately apply defined safety precautions in emergency situations.
- Ability to effectively utilize a variety of communication technologies.
- In depth knowledge of pre-hospital EMS systems and operations.

EDUCATION AND EXPERIENCE: This position requires a minimum of five years of progressive supervisory experience as an EMS manager preferred. Equivalent combinations of education and experience may be considered.

CERTIFICATIONS, LICENSES, AND REGISTRATIONS:

- Tennessee Licensed Paramedic strongly preferred with strong management and EMS experience.
- American Heart Association BLS Certification
- Medical Death Investigator Certification

LANGUAGE SKILLS: Ability to effectively communicate both orally and in writing to internal and external stakeholders. Must have the ability to read, analyze, and interpret general business periodicals, professional journals, technical procedures, governmental regulations, and

organizational documents. This position requires the ability to write reports, operational protocols, professional business correspondence, and procedural manuals. Requires the ability to effectively present information and respond to questions from internal and external stakeholders, including organizational leadership, clients, customers, and the general public.

REASONING ABILITY: This position requires the ability to solve practical and personnel problems, while dealing with a variety of variables in situations where only limited standardization exists. It also requires the ability to interpret a variety of instructions furnished in written, oral, spreadsheet, diagram, graph, or schedule form.

PHYSICAL DEMANDS: The physical demands described here are representative of those that must be met by an employee to successfully perform the essential functions of this job, as an EMS professional. While performing the duties of this job, the employee is regularly required to use their hands to handle or feel objects and demonstrate EMS skills as required. Employee must have the ability to sit, stand, walk, climb, carry heavy objects, balance, stoop, kneel, reach, crouch, crawl, hear, and smell.

WORK ENVIRONMENT: The work environment characteristics described here are representative of those an employee could encounter while performing essential job functions as an EMS professional. This position is required to work in a closed-office environment while preparing reports, delivering EMS related training, and providing demonstrations to a variety of groups. These activities may occur in a variety of building types. The employee will regularly work indoors and will occasionally be exposed to vibrations and moving mechanical parts. The employee may also be required to work outdoors in adverse weather conditions, day or night, and may occasionally be exposed to wet and humid conditions. They will also be required to respond to a variety of emergency scene call types. The noise levels are normal, but the position may occasionally be exposed to loud noises during training exercises or emergency situations.

EQUIPMENT UTILIZED: A variety of medical equipment will be used on a regular basis. Technical equipment such as computers, software programs, video conferencing systems, audio / visual equipment, and projectors will also be used. The employee must be able to safely operate assigned department vehicles in both daily operations and emergency response.

SUPERVISORY RESPONSIBILITIES: This position is responsible for the supervision of more than 130 personnel. Purpose

This operational guideline will define the role and responsibilities of the Chief of Emergency Medical Services while employed by Sumner EMS. This job description does not necessarily cover every task or duty that the Chief might be assigned. The role and responsibilities listed will be used as guidelines.

POLICY

The Chief of EMS performs executive management duties and assignments in the Department of Emergency Medical Services. The Chief is responsible for planning, implementing policies, evaluating systems and coordinating the County's Emergency Medical Services Department. The Chief works closely with the County's medical director, local and regional EMS resources, local volunteer Fire/EMS providers and agencies. This position works directly under the supervision of the County Executive

Responsibilities

- 1. Oversees the daily operations of the Emergency Medical Services in accordance with Federal, State, and County laws, regulations, policies and procedures.
- 2. Oversees the ordering of, inventory and record keeping of controlled dangerous substances according to standards set by the federal code and the State of Tennessee.
- 3. Establishes, implements and monitors departmental goals, objectives, policies and procedures. Provides leadership, planning direction and develops long and short-range goals for Sumner County EMS.
- 4. Establishes policies and procedures to ensure compliance with licensing and certification requirements for the County's EMS employees.
- 5. Extrapolate data from statistics to show strengths and weaknesses of the County's current EMS System.
- 6. Researches grant opportunities for the County's EMS system.
- 7. Assists in the preparation of and administration of budgets for the Emergency Medical Services Department.
- 8. Attends, after normal business hours, various meetings conferences, workshops and training sessions, as needed. provides and
- determinations makes personnel, against complaints 9. Investigates

recommendations for additional action.

- 10. Responds to citizen questions and inquiries in a courteous and timely manner.
- 11. Coordinates with local law enforcement agencies on various issues concerning Emergency Medical Services.
- 12. Coordinates with State and Local Health Departments on various health concerns/issues.
- 13. Staffs the Emergency Operations Center in the event of natural and/or man-made disasters.
- 14. Coordinates EMS requests/activities with various civilian and governmental agencies.
- 15. Serves on various state and local EMS committees, as requested and/or needed.
- 16. Performs the duties of a Paramedic as necessary, providing non-emergency and emergency lifesaving interventions.
- 17. Represents Sumner County EMS at various local and state level functions.
- 18. Performs general clerical tasks, which may include answering telephones, recording, relaying messages, using various office equipment (Fax machine, copier, projector, etc.).
- 19. Performs related work as required.

Work Environment/ Physical Demands

- 1. The work environment involves the everyday risks or discomforts, which require normal safety precautions typical of such places as offices, meeting and training rooms, etc. The work area is adequately lighted, heated, and ventilated.
- 2. Work primarily in an office setting under generally favorable working conditions. There may be some walking, standing, bending, carrying of light items, etc. No special physical demands are required to perform the work.
- 3. This classification may, from time to time, function in the capacity of a paramedic and assume the work environment/physical demands as listed below:
 - A. The work environment can involves high risks with exposure to various types of hazardous conditions, adverse weather, and individuals in highly stressful situations.
 - B. The work requires considerable and strenuous physical exertion such as lifting heavy objects over 50 pounds, crouching or crawling in restricted areas, and working under stress for substantial periods of time.

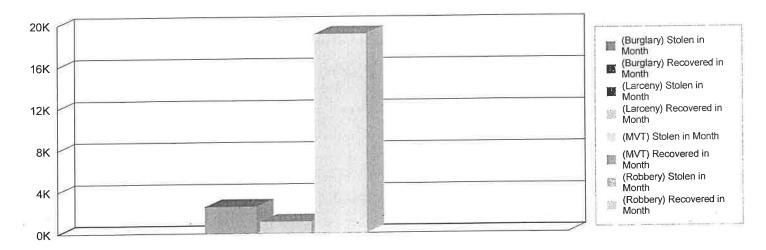
Traffic Accidents for Month

A RESOLUTION RESCINDING ACTIONS AND ESTABLISHING NEW PROCEDURES REGARDING THE SUMNER COUNTY EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES AND APPOINTING A DEPARTMENT CHIEF TO COORDINATE AND OVERSEE THE SUMNER COUNTY EMEREGENCY MEDICAL SERVICE.

WHEREAS, the General Assembly of the State of Tennessee has enacted Public Chapter 212 effective April 22, 2021 amending T.C.A. § 7-61-101 et seq. The Act provides that ambulance service is hereby designated as an essential service in the State of Tennessee; and

WHEREAS, the General Assembly of the State of Tennessee recognizes the importance in providing adequate emergency medical and trauma services is a matter of statewide concern, and

WHEREAS, the Sumner County Commissioners see the importance in providing adequate emergency medical and trauma services here in Sumner County, and

WHEREAS, the Board of County Commissioners, with the input of committee members have addressed and considered those factors that will have the best chance of improving outcomes for individuals who are sick, injured, or otherwise incapacitated or helpless, and

WHEREAS, the Board of County Commissioners believe that ongoing coordination and collaboration with local emergency response agencies and others will lead to improvements in medical care, response times, quality, and oversight, and

WHEREAS, the Board of County Commissioners believe that transferring day to day operations of Sumner County Emergency Medical Services to the direction of the Health and Emergency Services Committee will benefit the public; and establishing day to day operations of the Sumner County Emergency Medical Services shall be transferred to the direction of the Health and Emergency Services Committee will benefit the public; and

WHEREAS, the Health and Emergency Services Committee shall oversee the day to day operations shall including but not limited to appointing the Chief of Sumner County Emergency Medical Services Chief, who shall be the point of contact for capital projects pertaining to the Sumner County Emergency Medical Services,

WHEREAS, the intent of the Sumner County Health and Emergency Services Committee and the Board of County Commissioners is to provide all citizens throughout Sumner County Countyline-to-Countyline coverage and provide by agreement outside county line coverage of Emergency Medical Services; and
