# **Latimer (Brown) House – Project Status Report**

*April 16, 2026*

## **Project Status and Direction**

The committee heard from the project architects after their recent site visit. Based on what they saw, GenOps confirmed we are moving forward with the same restoration approach that was unanimously approved back in July 2025. The goal remains the same, preserve the structure and, where it makes sense, bring it back closer to its original late 1700s to mid-1800s condition. It was also clear from the walkthrough that a number of key structural elements are still hidden behind later additions. Those areas will need to be opened up in a limited and controlled way before final design decisions can be made.

## **Approved Action – Phase 1**

The GenOps Committee unanimously approved moving forward with selective interior demolition as Phase 1. We are not tearing the building apart. The goal is to expose only what we need to see in order to understand the condition of the logs, verify window locations, identify any structural issues, and document historic features. The exterior brick and roof will remain in place during this phase to keep the structure protected from the elements.

## **Procurement and Execution**

The GenOps Committee also unanimously approved authorizing Chris Coker to perform the Phase 1 work, with a cost not to exceed \$9,999.99, in line with county procurement policy. Keeping this work under that threshold allows us to move forward without going through a formal RFP process and avoids unnecessary delay. Work can begin since a compliant quote has already been submitted and received.

## **Funding Confirmation**

Funding for this project has already been approved by the County Commission in the amount of approximately \$587,232. Those funds remain available. No additional appropriation or Budget Committee action is required to carry out this phase of the work.

## **Next Steps**

Once Phase 1 is complete, the architect will finalize the design based on what is actually uncovered during the interior work. From there, the next phase will move into exterior deconstruction, stabilization, and reconstruction, all based on those confirmed on-site findings and within the limits of the previously approved budget. All work will continue to follow county procurement and purchasing requirements. At the same time, coordination on site access and civil engineering work can move forward as needed.

### **AT A GLANCE**

**Total request: \$89,485**

**Covers:** Three work streams — existing conditions assessment, community engagement, and final report production — plus administrative contingency.

**Why this is the first deliverable:** The General Operations Committee has asked this committee for a report with at least two options. That report cannot be credibly produced without professional input on building conditions, community preferences, and preliminary cost and funding analysis. Authorizing this budget is the prerequisite to the work being done right.

## Executive Summary

The Old Courthouse Ad-Hoc Committee respectfully requests that the General Operations Committee authorize **\$89,485** in professional services funding to support the committee's work. This funding will support three essential work streams: a professional existing conditions assessment of the Old Sumner County Courthouse, a structured community engagement process, and production of a final report with preliminary concepts, cost ranges, and a funding strategy for the General Operations Committee's consideration.

This is the minimum professional support needed to produce a credible recommendation. A capital project of this magnitude — realistically based on comparable national projects — cannot be recommended based on volunteer effort alone. The committee's charge is too important, the building too significant, and the taxpayer investment too large to proceed without professional input.

### THE CHICKEN-AND-EGG PROBLEM

The General Operations Committee has asked this committee for a report with at least two options. A responsible report requires:

- An accurate understanding of the building's current condition and what renovation will actually cost;
- Defensible public input so recommendations reflect what Sumner County residents want;
- Professional programming, concept, and cost work so options are comparable and credible.

None of these can be produced without professional services. The committee cannot deliver the report General Operations has requested until this budget is authorized. Authorizing \$89,485 now is the prerequisite to everything else.

## Budget Summary

The requested \$89,485 is allocated across four categories:

## Proportionality

A \$89,485 professional services budget is **less than 1% of the projected capital project cost** for a courthouse renovation of this scale. Industry standards for pre-design professional services on capital projects typically fall in the 1.5–2% range. This budget is intentionally lean and at the low end of what is typical for comparable work.

Comparable recently completed or in-progress courthouse renovations nationally:

Project	Project Cost	Scale
Cass County, MI (2024)	\$9.6M	~15,000 sq. ft.
Wise County, TX (2025)	\$14.2M	~20,000 sq. ft.
Howard County, MD (in progress)	\$15M+	~80,000 sq. ft.
Merced County, CA (in progress)	\$3.5M (exterior only)	~15,000 sq. ft.

All of these projects had professional pre-design work funded before capital investment was approved. The request before General Operations is consistent with, and more conservative than, what peer counties have invested at this stage.

## Work Stream 1: Existing Conditions Assessment

Budget: \$34,250

### Scope of Work

Engage a qualified preservation architect (with experience on historic public buildings) to deliver a professional conditions assessment of the Old Sumner County Courthouse. The assessment will cover:

- **Building envelope:** exterior walls, roof, windows, doors, masonry, and waterproofing condition
- **Major systems overview:** HVAC, plumbing, electrical, fire protection — general condition and likely replacement needs (not full MEP engineering design)
- **Structural overview:** visible structural condition, foundation, floor systems, roof framing
- **Code and accessibility gaps:** current building code compliance, ADA accessibility, life safety
- **Historic preservation constraints:** character-defining features, Secretary of the Interior's Standards considerations
- **Deliverable:** written report with photographs, summary of findings, and priority-ranked list of needed work

### Why this work stream matters

Every subsequent decision the committee makes depends on an accurate understanding of the building's condition. Cost estimates, use feasibility, timeline projections, and funding strategies are all dependent on knowing what we are actually dealing with. A volunteer committee cannot responsibly assess structural, envelope, or systems conditions.

### What this scope does not include

This assessment does not include detailed MEP engineering design, full environmental (asbestos/lead) testing, structural engineering calculations, or construction documents. Those are design-phase deliverables that come after the committee's recommendation is accepted and capital funding is in place. This assessment provides the foundation for the committee's report — not the construction-ready design.

### Potential offset

The Federal Historic Preservation Fund (HPF) grant program, administered in Tennessee by the Tennessee Historical Commission, provides 60% reimbursement for qualifying conditions assessments on National Register-listed properties. The Old Courthouse is a contributing structure in the Gallatin Downtown Historic District (listed since 1985), and is therefore likely eligible. If an HPF grant is awarded, as much as \$20,550 of this \$34,250 could be reimbursed to the county, reducing net cost to approximately \$13,700. Application windows are typically January–February.

## Work Stream 3: Final Report Production

**Budget: \$27,615**

### Scope of Work

Engage a consultant (likely the same preservation architect firm retained for the conditions assessment, or a related firm) to produce the final report deliverables for the General Operations Committee.

Deliverables include:

- **Space programming analysis:** translation of conditions assessment findings and engagement results into a defensible program of uses and square-foot allocations — how many square feet are available, which uses fit where, and what capacities are realistic
- **Preliminary concept diagrams:** schematic floor plan diagrams showing how recommended uses fit within the existing building, with written descriptions (not fully rendered architectural illustrations, which would be a later phase)
- **Order-of-magnitude cost range:** cost estimate expressed as a range (e.g., "\$12–\$18 million") based on square-foot benchmarks from comparable courthouse renovation projects, adjusted for Gallatin-specific conditions
- **Funding strategy:** identification of specific federal, state, local, and philanthropic funding sources for the project, including timing, eligibility, and match requirements
- **Final report document:** professionally produced final report to the General Operations Committee, presenting at least two options with comparative analysis

### Why this work stream matters

The final report is the committee's primary deliverable. Its quality determines whether the General Operations Committee can confidently act on its recommendations. A report produced by volunteer effort alone — without professional programming, cost work, or funding analysis — will not meet the standard a decision of this magnitude deserves.

### What this scope does not include

This budget does not include full architectural renderings, schematic design, detailed cost estimating, or construction documents. Those are design-phase deliverables that follow acceptance of the committee's recommendation and capital funding. If the committee later determines that renderings are needed for public presentation or political support, that would require supplemental authorization estimated at \$14,750–\$34,850.

## Work Stream 2: Community Engagement

**Budget: \$19,735**

### Scope of Work

Engage an engagement consultant or qualified firm to structure and execute a public input process that produces defensible findings for the committee's report. Deliverables include:

- **Digital survey:** online survey instrument hosted on a county-accessible platform, promoted through county and city channels, Historic Downtown Gallatin, and local media; target of 500+ responses over 6–8 weeks
- **Structured stakeholder interviews:** approximately 15 one-on-one interviews with downtown property owners, Main Street businesses, the museum, the Chamber, the historical society, veterans groups, arts organizations, and other community stakeholders
- **Two public meetings:** facilitated town-hall-style public meetings (one to collect input, one to present findings and gather reaction), held at the Old Courthouse itself if conditions allow
- **Synthesis and reporting:** professional summary of findings including themes, areas of consensus, areas of disagreement, and demographic cross-tabs

### Why this work stream matters

The stakeholder comments the committee has already received demonstrate the need for structured engagement. Early input reflects strong differences of opinion among downtown stakeholders — from a boutique hotel to a food hall to museum relocation to mixed-use commercial. A structured process lets the committee distinguish between widely held preferences and loud individual voices. Without it, the committee's eventual recommendation can be attacked as not reflecting real community input.

Howard County, Maryland's recently approved courthouse reuse plan followed a structured public process that collected over 600 stakeholder comments before use decisions were made. That scale is aspirational for Gallatin; the structure — survey plus interviews plus public meetings — is achievable within this budget.

### What this scope does not include

This budget covers one engagement cycle. If the committee determines that additional engagement is needed later in the process (for example, to test specific concept options once developed), that would require supplemental authorization.

## **Work Stream 4: Committee Administration & Contingency**

**Budget: \$7,885**

### **Scope**

This budget covers:

- **Public meeting logistics:** room setup, audio/visual, sign-in, refreshments for two public meetings
  - **Printing:** committee packets, handouts, public meeting materials, final report copies
  - **Public notice:** any paid legal notices required for public meetings
  - **Contingency reserve:** approximately \$2,835 held as reserve for unforeseen needs such as expert testimony, translation services, or supplemental consultant time
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## Procurement, Timeline, and Accountability

### Procurement approach

All three professional services work streams will be procured in accordance with Sumner County procurement policies. Because the total committee budget is \$89,485 and individual work streams range from \$19,735 to \$34,250, most or all engagements will likely fall below formal competitive bidding thresholds and may be procured through request-for-qualifications (RFQ) or direct contracting with qualified firms, subject to county policy.

The committee will work with county staff and the County Attorney to ensure all contracting is consistent with applicable policies and state law.

### Accountability

The committee commits to the following accountability measures:

- Quarterly progress reports to the General Operations Committee, including financial status against this budget
- Committee meetings open to the public per the Tennessee Open Meetings Act
- All consultant deliverables made available for review by the General Operations Committee
- Return of unspent funds to the county general fund at the conclusion of the committee's work
- Any proposed supplemental authorization (e.g., for renderings, additional engagement, or other scope expansion) will be brought back to the General Operations Committee for separate approval

## Risk of Not Authorizing This Budget

If this budget is not authorized, the committee faces three options — none of which are acceptable:

### Option A: Proceed with volunteer effort alone.

The committee would attempt to produce conditions analysis, engagement findings, concept programming, cost estimates, and funding strategy using only volunteer time. The resulting report would lack professional credibility, would not be defensible against public or political scrutiny, and would expose the county to criticism for making a capital investment of this magnitude without adequate pre-design work.

### Option B: Recommend without a professional basis.

The committee could skip the analysis and simply recommend a preferred use based on member judgment. This would produce a recommendation the General Operations Committee cannot responsibly act on — it would require the same professional work to be commissioned later before any capital investment could proceed, meaning a delay of months or years and a poorer process overall.

### Option C: Indefinite delay.

The committee could pause its work until funding becomes available. This delays a decision the community is already waiting for, extends the period during which the building continues to deteriorate, and risks the committee losing momentum and member engagement.

### THE COMMITTEE'S RECOMMENDATION

Authorize \$90,000 now. The investment is proportionate to the decision it supports. The alternative is either a flawed report or a delayed one — neither serves Sumner County.

Trae Primrose of 432 Triple Crown Circle, Gallatin spoke to the Sheriff's report and spoke on behalf of the 676 Sumner County residents who have signed a petition urging the dissolution of the 287(g) contract. He asked for accountability and transparency regarding the topic.

Mandy Cook of 123 East Harbor, Hendersonville spoke about the increase in the number of arrests and cooperation under the 287(g) contract.

James Jones of 1135 Fowler Ford Road, Portland spoke to the 287(g) contract with ICE and the Sumner County Sheriff's Department. He stated he would like to see the statistics on how crime has changed for the better.

Brooklynn White of 933 Sunset Drive, asked for arrests numbers and violations along with number of ICE detentions and transfers for community understanding. She also expressed support for the VFD coordinator position.

Brad Williams of 1916 Hwy 31W, Goodlettsville spoke to the VFD coordinator position and stated the volunteers are in favor of this position. He spoke to the funding change for this year and asked to approve an additional \$40,000.00 for each VFD this budget cycle.

Patricia Smith of 112 England Pl., Hendersonville asked for more transparency with the Sheriff's report regarding the 287(g) contract.

#### 6. Report of the Chairman.

Chairman Rogers reported he forgot to add an item to the agenda.

#### 8. Report of the Sheriff.

Not present.

Chairman Rogers gave a brief overview of the submitted reports. Reports attached.

9. Report of Emergency Management Agency.

EMA Director Ken Weidner gave a brief update from the winter ice storm. Encouraged everyone to get brush to the right of way for pick up. He stated there are problems with the Code Red system and in process of finding a vendor for a new mass notification system.

10. Report of EMS.

Not present. Reports attached.

11. Report of the ECC.

County Mayor Isbell gave report. Calls for service in April 28,939 with total for the year 112,114.

12. Volunteer Fire Department Ad-hoc.

Comm. Wynne reported that the ad hoc committee met twice to discuss budgetary needs to ensure adequate funding. The committee determined that annual operating expenses would total \$2,000,000.00 for nine departments across thirteen locations, with an additional \$19,000,000.00 needed to bring equipment, apparatus, and personal protective equipment (PPE) up to date. Commissioner Wynne also explained the need for a Fire Coordinator position and outlined the responsibilities associated with the role.

13. Old Business.

a. Tower Infrastructure (EMA).

Removed from the agenda.

14. New Business .

a. VFD discussion to create a county fire coordinator.

Comm. Schmit moved, seconded by Comm. Harris, to discuss. The motion carried unanimously.

Comm. Wynne explained the ask for the position is a salary between \$70,000.00 and \$90,000.00 plus benefits. He further explained that the position is strictly administrative.

During discussion, Law Director Eric Sitler explained that the Fire Coordinator position would serve in an advisory capacity only. He further outlined the statutory options available, including non-profit volunteer fire department management, a county-hired Fire Coordinator, or the establishment of fire districts. He stated that, should the Fire Coordinator option be pursued, the position would operate under the Mayor's Office.

Chairman Rogers moved, seconded by Comm. Schmit, to move forward with the fire coordinator position and forward to the Budget Committee. The Committee voted (4-1-0) to approve. Comm. Hyde voted against.

- b. VFD stop gap funding matching fundraising or grant awards up to \$40,000.00 for 26/27 budget cycle.

Comm. Schmit moved, seconded by Comm. Harris, to discuss. The motion carried unanimously.

Law Director Eric Sitler expressed his concern about whether the matter could legally proceed due to notice requirements.

Comm. Wynne recommended quarterly matching.

Comm. Hyde moved, seconded by Comm. Klein, to send to the Budget Committee for consideration. The motion carried unanimously.

15. Adjournment. Chairman Rogers declared the meeting adjourned at 6:11 p.m. upon motion by Comm. Schmit and duly seconded.

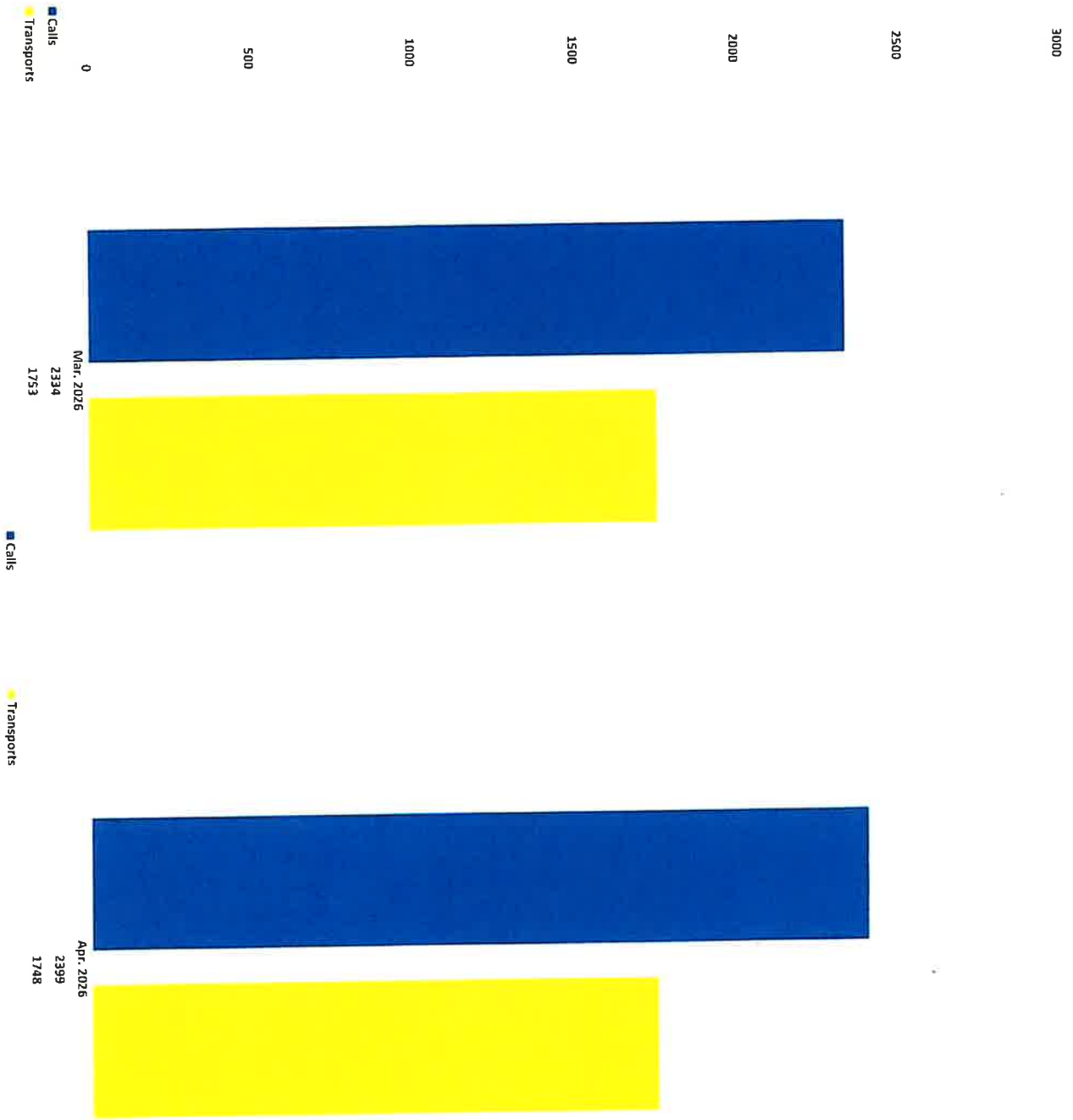

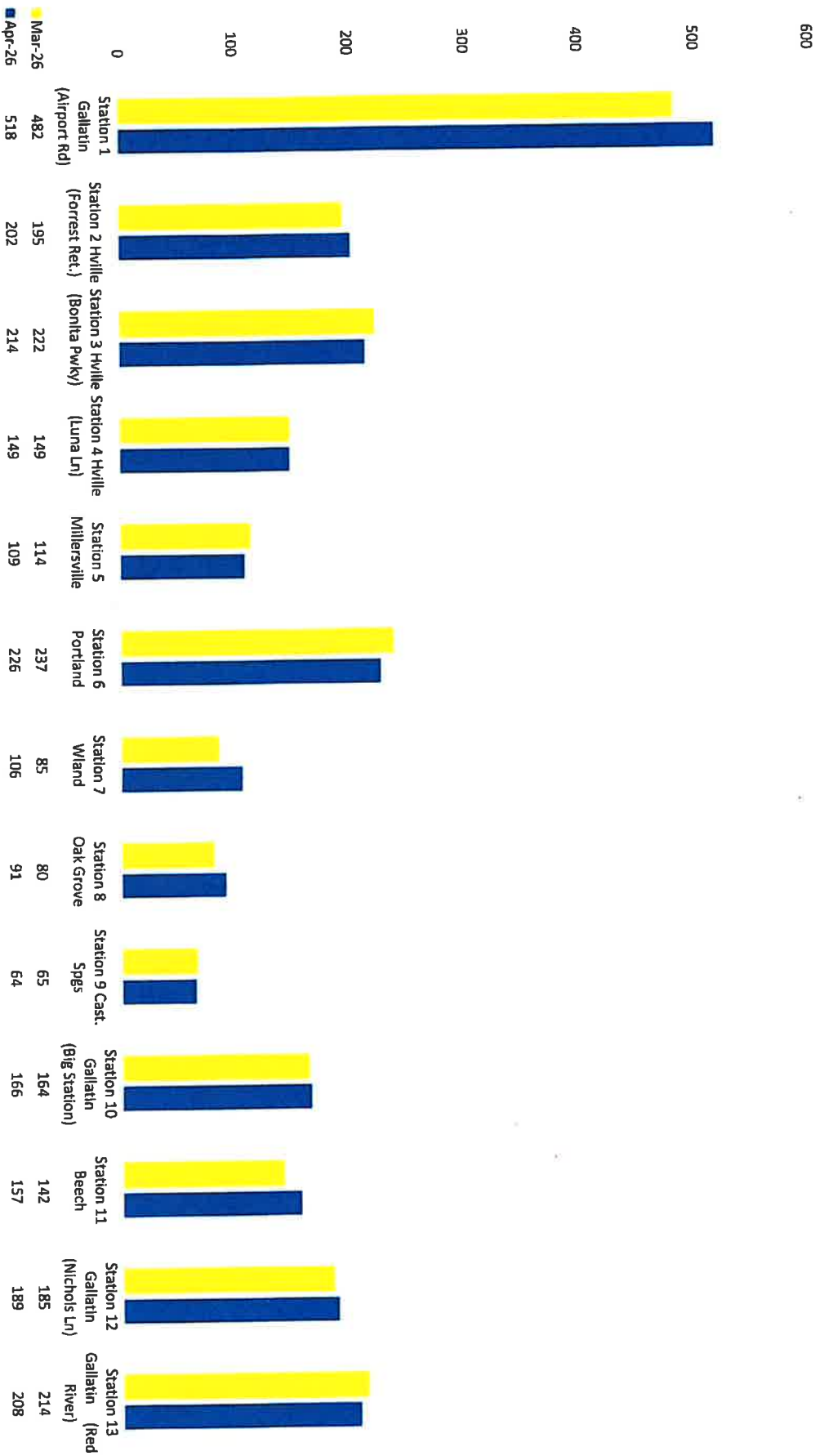

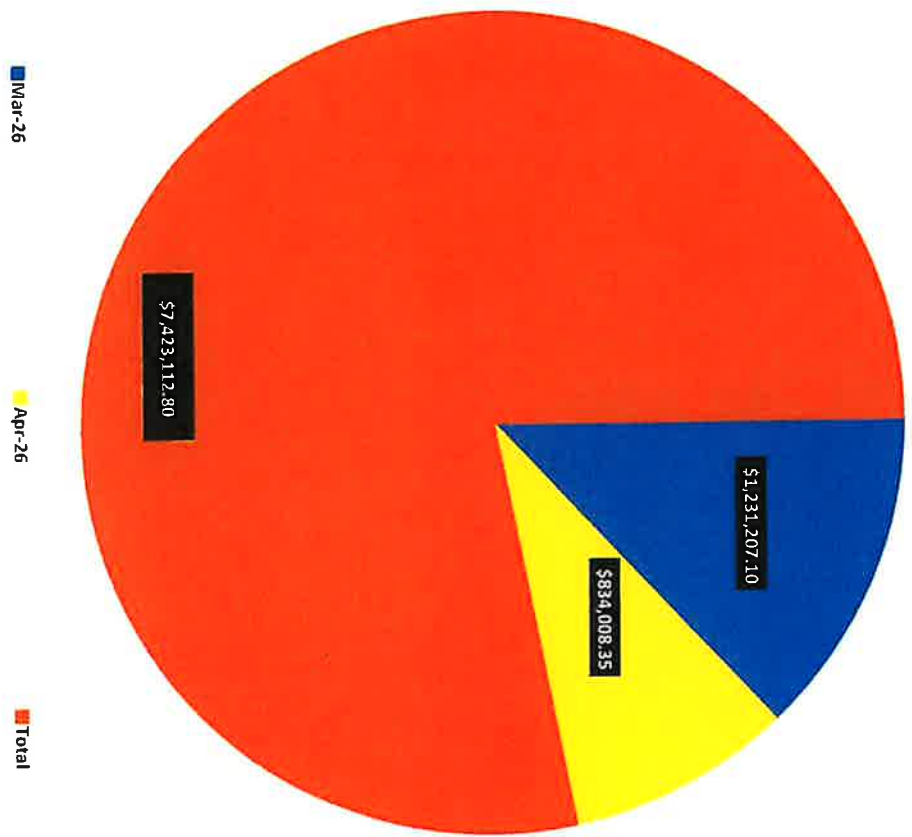
### Calls vs. Transports

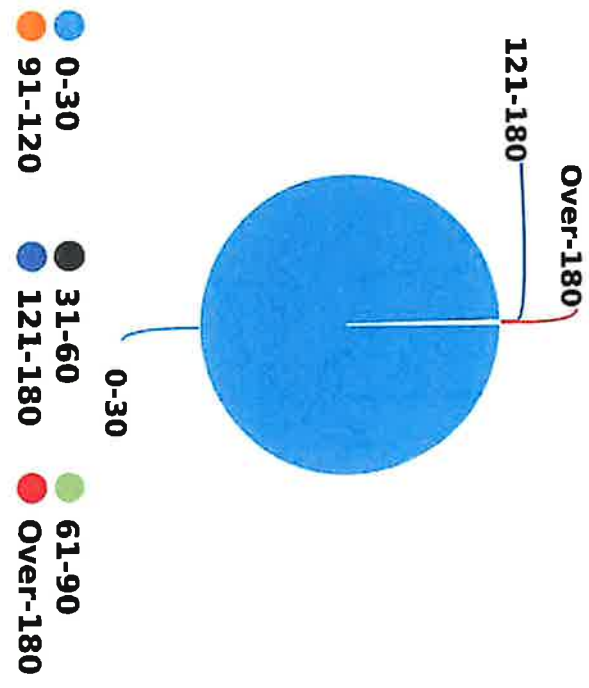
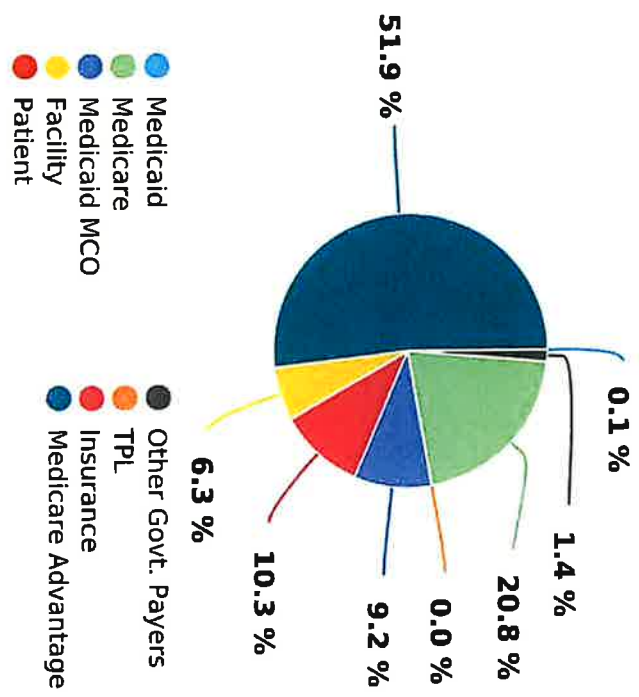

### 1 VOLUNTEER RECRUITMENT IS HARDER THAN IT USED TO BE



Competing work schedules, family demands, and limited free time are reducing the number of people able or willing to serve consistently. Chiefs and existing members are left doing more – recruiting, onboarding, paperwork, and administrative tasks – on top of their operational responsibilities.

NFPA reports the U.S. volunteer fire service has lost nearly a quarter of its members since 2008.

### 2 TRAINING AND CERTIFICATION TAKE TOO LONG



Low frequency of medical-related training and lack of coordination between departments lengthen the timeline for new recruits to become fully trained and certified. This slows readiness and makes it harder to retain new volunteers.

Tennessee's statewide training system ensures quality – but coordination is key to efficiency.

### 3 COUNTYWIDE LEADERSHIP AND REPRESENTATION ARE FRAGMENTED



There is no single administrative point of coordination for planning, reporting, training, grants, communication, and representation across VFDs and partner agencies (EMA, EMS, ECC). This leads to duplicated effort, missed opportunities, and slower problem-solving.

Chairman Rogers,

The VFD Adhoc committee met again last night as we continue to unpack and study the funding needs of our VFDs. One topic the committee took up last night was a solution for stop gap funding for the 26-27 budget cycle.

We looked at the projected income provided by our VFDs to include what is currently being proposed in our 26-27 budget for VFD donations from Sumner County, fundraisers, other donations received, and grants awarded and compared it to the projected expenses reported by our VFDs for this budget cycle. In doing so the Adhoc committee has recognized there is a funding gap that the Adhoc committee believe needs to be closed and as such voted to approve the below recommendation.

There was also another area on the income side that the Adhoc committee recognized should also be addressed and that any recommendation offered should incentivize sustainable behavior for the VFDs as well as the County.

**Recommended Proposal** - Sumner County will match dollar for dollar any fundraising contributions or grant awards to the VFDs up to \$40k for the 26-27 budget cycle.

This recommended proposal could close the funding gap compared to last years funding levels for those VFDs that are willing to actively fundraise and pursue grants as a part of their income. The Adhoc committee believes this is a fair approach that encourages community engagement as well as a more balanced approach to funding large needed capital expenditures for our VFDs.

I am hopeful this can be added to the May 4th HEMS agenda for consideration.

Esteemed Members of the "Highways Commission",

Yesterday I went to the Liberty Creek School Campus to see that all damage to curb & gutter, sidewalks and asphalt had been taken care of for this commission to give a positive recommendation on the County's acceptance of "Wolfpack Way". Although it is evident that some work has been done, attached are pictures of defects and/or damage that still remain. Based on what I witnessed I could not vote for acceptance of this road as there will be much repair work coming up soon and I do not believe the taxpayers of Sumner County would want me to accept responsibility for this on their behalf nor would they want me to accept the liability that exists because of the damage that is there currently. I strongly urge this commission to send the road approval back to the school district so that the road can be made ready for county acceptance.

I would like to point out some of the defects in the event they are not obvious to you.

- 1.) A low spot in the gutter where gravel and sand settle. This is quite common in much of the curb and gutter on this street. Generally grinding of the gutter and water testing is the remedy.
- 2.) Chipped and damaged curb facing is also quite common on the road. Sometimes patching will work as a fix. Bad damage (such as this) requires removal and replacement
- 3.) This is the entry to the settlement pond on the southeast corner of the property. If this will continue to be accessed, the C & G should be removed and replaced with a drive apron.
- 4.) Same as picture 1... an oversight!
- 5.) Another low spot
- 6.) Damaged curb face and gutter surface.
- 7.) Low spot entering the high school parking lot.
- 8.) Structural cracks in the asphalt can allow water to enter and compromise the substrate.
- 9.) A sidewalk that is submerged with every rain.

- 10.) The same picture as 9 focusing on the low spots in the gutter.
- 11.) Damaged curb face and questionable cold joint between two pours.
- 12.) Damaged curb face.
- 13.) Expansion of picture #7 showing continuation of problems on the other side of the drive.
- 14.) Same as picture #7 (for ease of viewing).
- 15.) More damaged curb.
- 16.) More damaged curb.
- 17.) More damaged curb and differential settlement of gutter.
- 18.) Entrance to the old sewage pickup. Structurally damaged gutter and low spot collecting gravel. Needs to be removed and replaced.
- 19.) Differential settlement in C & G.
- 20.) Low spot prior to catch basin collecting gravel and dirt.
- 21.) Structural damage to C & G as well as sidewalk at drive entrance of elementary school.
- 22.) Catch basin at far southwest end of "Wolfpack Way" has strange "Spalling" of concrete surface. Freeze/Thaw will rapidly deteriorate this section.
- 23.) Severe curb damage.
